#### 1. Call to Order & Introductions:

President Nikki Harless called the meeting to order at 1:32 p.m. and began introductions. In person quorum was met.

## 2. Approval of August 5th, 2021 meeting minutes:

Sharlene moved, and Joe T. seconded a motion to approve the August 5th minutes. The motion passed by a voice vote.

## 3. Treasurer's Report:

Carmen provided the July report. She explained a budget amendment for Juvenile Court and Council reserves as funds were received in July for last year. Juvenile Court budget increased to \$51,750 and Family Council Reserves increased to \$157,443.00. July monthly receipts were \$310,982.08, and expenditures were \$285,865.94 for a cash balance of \$1,666,692.88.

Joe T. made a motion to approve the July report with the budget amendment to file for audit as presented. Michele seconded the motion. The motion passed by a voice vote.

# 4. Executive Session to consider employment of a public employee

Tony made a motion to enter executive session to consider employment of a public employee. Sharlene seconded the motion. Niki conducted the roll call vote.

Guests were excused and the Zoom session was muted for Executive Session.

Nikki reported that the meeting is back on the record. Guests were invited back into the room and the Zoom session was unmuted.

Michele made a motion to hire James Davis at \$22.50 per hour, forty hours per week with benefits to begin on September 16, 2021. Probation will be nine months. Kevin second the motion. The motion passed by a voice vote.

Sharlene and Teresa will seek approval from the County Commissioners next week.

#### 5. Sterkel Park Request

Carmen and Teresa sought legal advice from the Prosecutor's office and the Ohio Family Children First Office and Ohio Department of Job and Family Service. Local pooled funds that are not reported to OFCFC can be used for purposes in accordance with the specific purposes as defined by the designating department. Carmen provided a report of pooled funds from Mental Health Board, Richland Public Health, and Newhope. Since 2016, \$127,67672 of their funds were not spent and have been carried over. Those three agencies have provided a letter of support to utilize their funds to support the Sterkel Park project. Children Services also provided a letter of support for the use of the local funds. (CSB funds are restricted and will not be used, but the letter was provided as general support.)

Tony made a motion to authorize the Youth and Family Council to reimburse an entity for the purchase of playground equipment via an invoice for up to \$127,676.72. Joe T. seconded the motion. The motion passed by a voice vote.

## 6. Foster Grandparent Presentation

Melissa Shamel from the Corporation for Ohio Appalachian Development presented the Foster Grandparent Program. She is looking for schools and day care centers to be potential sites. She is also looking for older adults, over 55 who are interested in volunteering their time for a small stipend and mileage reimbursement. Volunteers are trained and complete a thorough background check. There are numerous benefits for both the children and the volunteers. # 7. Early Intervention Report

Julie provided the Early Intervention Report. There are 315 duplicated Early Intervention referrals, which is an increase from 219 last year. There are 113 children enrolled and 44 in referral status. Julie shared that she had contact with Akron Children's Hospital about getting Autism diagnosis, but they have a shortage of providers trained and willing to make the diagnosis. Julie is pleased that parent and physician referrals remain high.

# 8. Communities of Support Grant/OhioRISE

The Communities of Support grant was extended to the current fiscal year. There is a purchase order set up for Catalyst to provide plans of safe care. Children Services staff will provide discharge follow up services. The Council Service Coordinators will provide the CANS assessment for the Qualified Residential Treatment Placement. Kali is participating in the

training that will be ongoing in September. James should be able to join that training also. The services will begin October 1, 2021.

Michele continues to monitor the progress of OhioRISE which will be a waiver service for multisystem youth. OhioRise and the other new and improved Medicaid programs have moved their launch date to July 1, 2022. Teresa provided a PowerPoint slide from Aetna Better Health of Ohio which was presented at the Ohio Family Children First Council association meeting. There is a great deal of anxiety among other counties as they have limited staff and resources. Richland is in a good place as there are resources available and adding another service coordinator gives the staff time to take the training and prepare for the changes.

The desired outcome with the child care initiative is to provide support to child care centers, in home providers and assist all providers in earning their Step Up To Quality ratings. Promoting trauma informed care in the child care setting was another desired outcome. Other desired outcomes is to maintain children safely at home. The Implicit Bias training was purchased to assist Council agencies in training their staff. The outcome for yoga is to assist multisystem youth and young children in child care settings to learn self regulation and relaxation techniques.

#### What Was the Actual Outcome of Using These Flexible Dollars?

The learning pods were helpful to the families that took advantage of the opportunity. Transportation was a barrier to some. When possible, that barrier was addressed. Childcare investment has been helpful in adding new in home providers. The trauma training incentive was appreciated by those who received it.

#### Community Collaboration

- Three El service coordinators attended community baby shower on 9/23/21 and collaborating with Ashland County El. The service coordinators provided 135 Outreach packets with developmental materials.
- Purchased lead handout, rattles, bags for future outreach

#### Compliance:

Richland County will be reviewed in 2022 for transition compliance. Months reviewed will be Oct, Nov, Dec 2021. Information was submitted to state for October monitoring of Grant on 9/29/21.

#### Family stories submitted with the October report:

In the last year since the family moved from the home where lead was identified, lead levels in the children have dropped. Hunter goes to his mom and other family members for love and comfort. He will give and receive affection from his family. He is protective of younger children at early head start and makes sure that they are taken care of. Hunter enjoys playing with other children at early head start and will imitate other children's play activities. He wants to be included in the play of peers. Hunter demonstrates both positive and negative emotions and will defend his property from other children. He transitions from activities easily and shows a willingness to try new things. Hunter is using words to make his wants and needs met and his thoughts and ideas known.

The team recently completed Hunter's annual assessment. Based on the assessment and that his lead levels have decreased, Hunter's mom and team felt his development is now age appropriate in all areas. His mom is happy with his progress and that he is doing so well and that she has learned how to help him throughout his day! His mom decided to withdraw from early intervention prior to age three.

\*\*\*\*\*

In the spring, a referral for a little guy was received to Early Intervention due to his medical diagnosis of NAS. Mom learned about early intervention from her El Service Coordinator. Mom was very interested in helping her son on his developmental journey. He is connected with WIC and had supports from his physician to deal with reflux. She worked with her doctor to obtain a letter so that his formula could be covered. At first he wasn't tolerating tummy time and the team began supports to guide mom in strategies to improve his tummy time experience. He receives direct supports from a developmental specialist and joint visits with a physical therapist. The family also receives supports from his HMG home visitor. Mom said she is concerned b/c Kasen is drooling so much and even choking on it and that her Help Me Grow home visitor told her it is a sign of illness so Brandi. The first very months for his mom were both physically and emotionally draining. After connecting with the physician, his mom learned his bowels were not moving correctly. The doctor provided massage strategies and was referred to a feeding evaluation.

Fast forward to Fall....Mom shared at a recent home visit he has been starting to sit up with the boppy pillow placed behind him. He is starting to babble more often and they are hearing "dada" all the time. He is still fisted much of the time - still with it being mostly when he is being held. Mom had a new little car toy that he can sit in it. The physical therapist shared how this is a great place to play so that he can balance on the sides of the car and move to reach the things he wants to touch. Coaching was provided to mom to give some support at the waist or at this thighs so that he is able to balance when working to get back up. Handing him 2 toys and doing some hand over hand banging them together. Sitting on leg and leaning him to the side and having him work to get himself back to sitting pushing up with his arms. This was easier for him to do to the right side. Playing on his tummy and moving toys to get him pivoting in either direction. Working to get him to pivot in a full circle and then move the toy in the opposite direction. Coaching mom to work on this daily as this will really help his arms get ready for crawling to help encouraged that over his rolling. Doing some assisted belly crawling to get to a ball toy. Talked about how the bolster had been working and mom shared he wasn't really a fan. She went and got his baby bath (it is a blown up rectangle) and showed how she had been using this in the same manner as I had shown her to use the bolster. He liked this much better as it has a bit more give to it and did some play on hands and knees and forearms and knees while laying over it. Encouraged mom to get him playing on hands and knees as much as possible, to increase belly crawling to get to desired objects and use toys in sitting to get him to lean forward and from side to side and then to sit back up. He had a great visit today and was very tolerant of some difficult positions that usually make him upset right away.

#### Outreach:

- \* Goal for SFY 22 will be outreach to Richland County Childcares and Families supporting children diagnosed with NAS and LEAD.
  - We are currently serving 2 children identified with NAS
  - We are currently working on 3 referrals for children identified with LEAD
    - two children live in the same home...the team is connected with our El program partner from Holmes county who assisted in their assessment and provided parent information. She will be monitoring their lead levels.
    - -one child was referred by a physician who shared there was a concern with speech but in speaking with mom the child has a lead level of 13. The El service coordinator is working on linkages with the family and our WI program partner from Holmes county.
